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

likes being hungry. No one Whenever you're hungry, it's your body telling you that something is lacking, something is missing, and something needs to be done about it. The feeling naturally moves us to get rid of it — I want to eat so that I can get rid of the hunger. I'd be willing to bet that daily, most of us experience that feeling of hunger — perhaps like the crowd in the Gospel today who followed Jesus into a deserted place. They were hungry, I'm sure. But I think

we can all agree that there's a hunger that we feel that can be more than physical — it's a spiritual hunger, a spiritual longing for something more. That's the hunger I want to focus on today. I'd imagine that at least some of us are at Mass today because of that hunger. We recognize that something is missing in our lives, there's something lacking, and we are looking somewhere - perhaps the only place we know — to fill that desire. The people in the Gospel today, I am sure, experienced physical hunger as the day drew to its end and there was no food in sight. But I would also imagine that they experienced a spiritual hunger that brought them out to the middle of nowhere to hear a wandering preacher and witness the healings that He was working on. They wanted more in their lives, and maybe, just maybe, He could do something about it.

Fr. Thomas Dubay, a great spiritual writer, describes man as an "incarnated thirst," "a thirst in the flesh." He says that we can't help but seek the thing that we thirst for and hunger for, in some attempt to satisfy that desire. I'd argue that almost everything we do,

everything we seek, is because of that hunger. That's a good thing — that's how God created us. But now, we are slowly drifting from this spiritual hunger, and our focus becomes more and more on material comforts. The majority of the time, "Our electronic gadgets" fills the space of most of our former quiet times, personal adorations and prayers. Do we have a set time for prayers?

And that's what He offers to us — something more than we could ever have imagined. As St. Paul tells us in the Second Reading today, as the Gospels always tell us, as the Church has done since the very beginning — Jesus offers us Himself. "This is My Body, given for you. This is My Blood, poured out for you." In this place, at this Mass, we come face to face with the only Person who can satisfy the hunger of our hearts. At first glance, that might seem disappointing — it looks like a piece of bread, and maybe it doesn't seem to have any concrete impact on my life. In the Gospel, the apostles' first thought was to use human means to satisfy the problem. But Jesus is working on a different perspective. He invites us not to fix but to trust. He invites us to look with the eyes of faith and to hear the truth of His words that we hear at every Mass: "This is truly My Flesh, given for you." He invites us to give Him a chance to satisfy that desire of our hearts. It's what the Church has done and has held onto faithfully from the very beginning because she has held faithfully to that promise of Jesus. The presence of the Eucharist, the true Body and Blood, is what makes the Church, is what defines our faith, and is what will endure to the end of our life.

Corpus Christi is a celebration and an experience of God's immense love for us who gave us the Bread from heaven. Do you truly believe that Jesus is the living Bread from heaven? Do you believe deeply enough to have your heart moved with love and profound devotion every time you are before our divine Lord present under the veil of the Eucharist? If so, on this Sunday, I would like to invite all to come and have this Eucharistic Experience by adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament during the Evening Meditation 5.30 PM at Kotara.

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing.

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.
