Good Samaritan

According to Tolstoy, a drama does not tell us the whole story of a person's life. What it does do is place a person in a situation. Then, from how the person deals with the situation, his or her character becomes evident. Jesus portrays the same attitude in this story of the Good Samaritan. He places the priest, the Levite and the Samaritan in a particular situation. They are faced with difficult decision making.



To stop and help the badly wounded man or to continue their own business. There is no escape for them and no place to hide in this situation that Jesus brings into this story. It is like a well-articulated Opera play. They have to commit themselves one way or the other. The priest and Levite decide to pass by. The Samaritan chooses to stop and help. Crisis does not create the character; it merely reveals it. In times of crisis, people show what is already inside them; a moment of a difficult time or event may cause a person to demonstrate his or her essential being. The encounter with the wounded man was such a moment for the priest, the Levite, and the Samaritan. We are living in a wounded world where we too are put in the same situation as in today's Gospel. Everywhere we see pain, crisis, Covid and now rain and floods. Some of the repeated events give us excruciating pain.

What did this parable reveal about the character of the priest and Levite? It showed how self-centred they were. We too have the "Me Me" attitude in our society and it seems to be becoming stronger. And then what did this story reveal about the character of the Samaritan? The Samaritan was a caringman, a man who could not pass another human being suffering in pain without wanting to give a helping hand to provide some relief to that person.

Dear friends, life is continually testing us, day in and day out. Every moment we are tested, for some maybe in a small way, while for others maybe through a considerable hardship.


MASS ROSTER— ANNOUNCEMENTS

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.' But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.'

Apostles' Creed
